

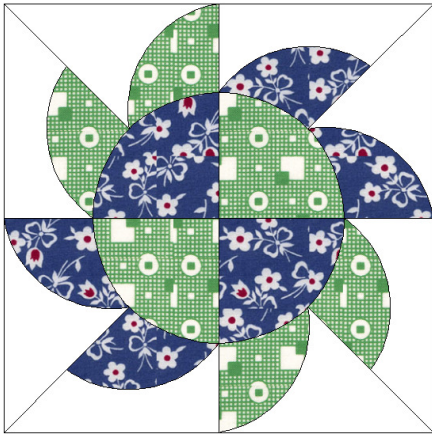
## Midget Blocks—Block 65

Midget Blocks are a series of wonderful little blocks adapted from an antique sampler quilt made during the 1930s. I hope you'll enjoy making these blocks and a sampler quilt of your own.

Most of these blocks were made using just two colors. A print or solid color and the background fabric. This block in the original quilt was constructed using a blue print, green plaid and the background fabric.

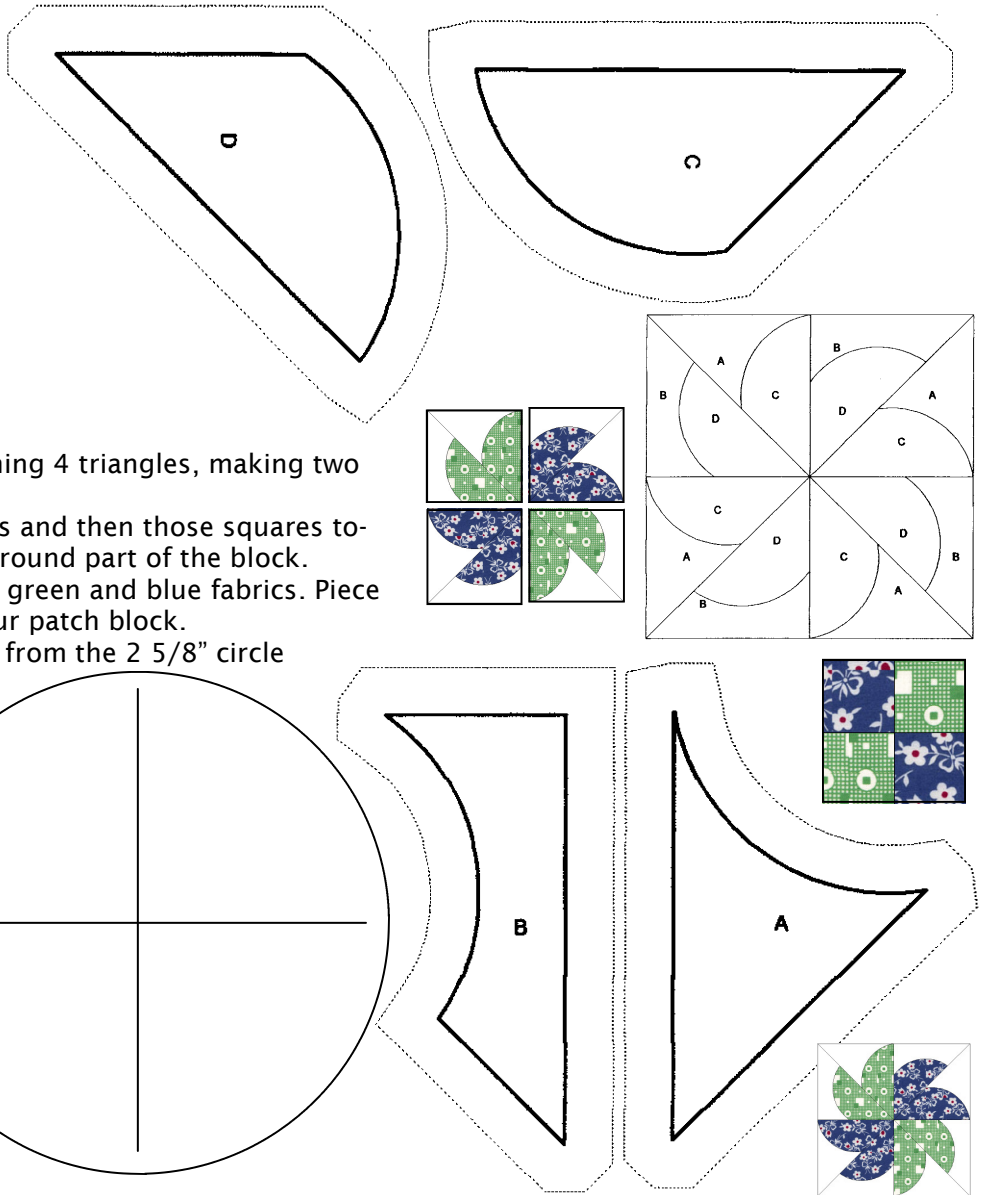
### Pride of the Prairie—4 1/2”

In the antique quilt this block is the eleventh block from the left in the fourth row.



This block is well suited to a combination of appliqué and machine piecing.

1. If you are hand piecing the A to C and B to D triangle sections, use the templates as provided and go one to step
2. If you are appliquéing the C and D pieces, cut 2 squares 3 1/8" and cut in half diagonally one way to yield 4 triangles.
3. Appliqué "C" pieces to four of the triangles, making two with green fabric and two with blue.
4. Appliqué "D" pieces to remaining 4 triangles, making two green and two blue.
5. Sew triangles together in pairs and then those squares together to complete the background part of the block.
6. Cut two 2" squares from your green and blue fabrics. Piece square together forming a four patch block.
7. Make a template for appliqué from the 2 5/8" circle shown below and cut the piece from your four patch block.
8. Appliqué to the center of the pieced background to complete the block.
