

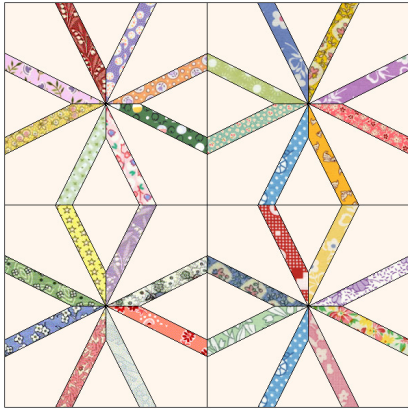
## Midget Blocks—Block 67

Midget Blocks are a series of wonderful little blocks adapted from an antique sampler quilt made during the 1930s. I hope you'll enjoy making these blocks and a sampler quilt of your own.

Most of these blocks were made using just two colors. A print or solid color and the background fabric. This block in the original quilt was constructed using a variety of print fabrics and the background fabric.

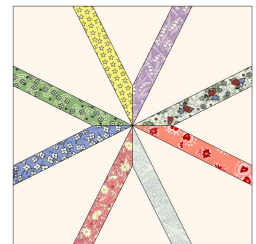
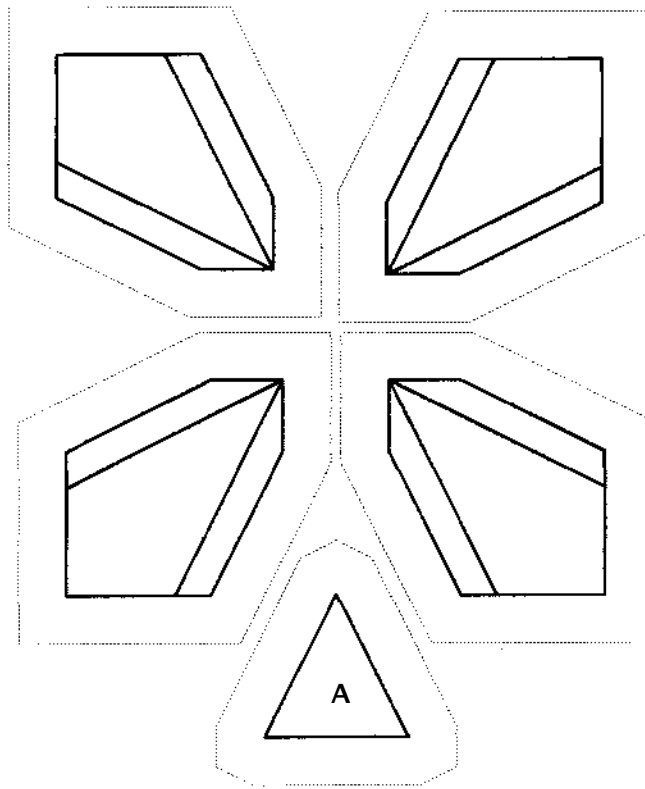
### Endless Chain—4 1/2"

In the antique quilt this block is the eleventh block from the left in the fourteenth row.



This block is well suited for a combination of foundation paper piecing and hand or machine piecing.

1. Foundation paper piece 16 of the sections with print fabric strips on each side.
2. Sew these together in groups of four along the short, center seams of the print strips. Remember to start and stop where the seam line begins and ends. Backstitch at those points.
3. Cut 4 "A" triangles from your background fabric for either hand or machine piecing depending on your chosen technique.
4. Inset an "A" triangle in each of the open sides of the units to form four squares.
5. Sew the four squares together to complete the block.



Make 4 sections like this

Your unfinished block should measure 5"
